

A message was delivered from the Excellency of the Lord Lieutenant, informing the House that there were many persons who had suffered in consequence of the late rebellion, but who did not come immediately under the description of a class at present legally described as suffering losses, and therefore requested that the House might enable his Majesty to assist such persons in the sum of 3000l. This message was referred to a committee of supply, which accordingly had complied therewith.

Sir W. G. NEWCOMEN, advertising to some observations which fell from the Chancellor of the Exchequer last night touching the exorbitant pretension gentlemen connected with Canals had made, expressed some surprize that the Right Hon. Gentleman did not discriminate, as those gentlemen, with whom he coincided on that subject, were far from being extravagant in their demands or expectations.

Lord CASTLEREAGH said, that the proceedings on this subject before the Committee, gave him considerable pain, from a sense that pretensions were formed totally subversive of the principle the Government had in view for the benefit of the country. He would avoid, however, giving any opinion on the detail of this subject; the object of forming a navigation between the metropolis and the Shannon had certain advantages, and he trusted, that cautious, by too great anxiety in forming imprudential views, would not defeat the good intentions the Government, nor impede the prosperity of the country.

The House having resolved into Committee on a compensation bill,

Mr. BALL proposed an amendment, particularly relative to the borough of Clagher, which represents, and to the effect, that as it was proved the lord of the soil had no influence or control in the borough, the compensation should be made to him but applied to the advantage of the inhabitants to some public works or building. He also objected to the appointment of commissioners by Parliament, and moved an amendment grounded on that objection.—After some observations both motions were negatived.

Lord CASTLEREAGH having moved that a blank relative to the salaries of the Compensation Commissioners should be filled up with the sum of 1200l.

Mr. SPEAKER objected to the mode as informal, the sum not having been first voted in a committee of Supply. This objection was attended to, and that particular clause being passed, the remaining clauses were then gone through, and the Chairman having reported properly, the House returned, and adjourned.

Wednesday, June 18.
Mr. CHAN. of EX. moved that a sum not exceeding 12000l. per annum, be granted to the Commissioners appointed to examine into claims for compensation in consequence of the Union, and that the House enable his Majesty to make good the same.—Ordered.

Mr. FITZGERALD, K. of Kerry, moved a resolution, which would allow the House to propose an amendment in the Judges' Annuity bill, the purpose of enabling his Majesty to extend the benefits of that act to the case of Mr. Barry, late Assistant Barrister of the county of Kerry, who, he said, had filled that situation 12 years with great ability, and to whose excellent administration of justice the whole Country represented bore the warmest testimony.—The great character at the head of the law in this country had declared, that he did not know any department a more meritorious public officer—and having been obliged by infirmity to resign his situation, in the full confidence that he should receive compensation similar to that intended for like judicial characters, he was convinced the Committee would gladly grant this award in the case of a gentleman of so much merit, who, if he had not retired early from the active pursuit of his profession, would now pro-

I will neither age or sex, excite pity in your Savage Breasts!—They then beat her Son, a sickly young man, so unmercifully, that his life is despaired of; broke the tankards and keelers, and spilt the milk of 40 dairy cows, for all which outrages they assigned no reason, but for not selling milk at such reduced prices as their High Mightinesses chose—with an additional tack to their orders, that they must give credit for their Milk until Michaelmas.

Yesterday, Michael Lyons, was tried under the Insurrection Act, before seven Magistrates, in the County Court, for having assembled contrary to Law, for the purpose of swearing in a Committee; he was sentenced to be transported.

—Two men of the name of Ryan, were likewise tried for a similar offence, and sentenced to be transported.
