The CHAN, of EX. role to obviate the objections made to the fird clause, respecting the Window Tax, by afferring it was merely a War Tax, raised to meet the exigencies of the times, and that is order to render it efficient, it became necessiry to give it a retrospective operation, in order to defeat the views of the difuffected, who otherwise would use every stratagem to evade the payment of it. It was confidently afferted by the gentlemen who had opposed the principle of this measure that numbers of persons since Jan. 1799, the period fixed for the commence-ment of the tax, had so far declined in their cireumlances as to fruitrate the expectations which the Government had formed from it ; but if every speculative difficulty which the ingenuity of its oppofers could fuggett, should be confidered a matter of weight and importance, such proceeding could only tend to clog a very rational and necessary mode of taxation without any material begefit to the fubject. After a few more defultory observations, he maved that the Window Tax do continue in farce for the period of three years, and no longer, provided war shall continue to long.

The SPEAKER opposed the motion, on the ground of informality, as tending to regulate the collection and continuance of a tax already expis

red, and not yet re-enacted.

The CHAN, of EX, in reply, conceded to the idea fuggested by the Speaker, and would move, that the Chairman do report progress, that he might then move for a Committee of Ways and Means, wherein to propose the tax.

After going through force other orders of the day, the Houle adjourned until to-morrow.

Wednelday in the House of Lords, the Register of the Court of Chancery was called to the bar to be examined touching the registry of allegations in a coule determined in the Ecclefialtical Court, Lukey against Kane. The Lord Chancellor interrogated a Mr. John Parker, attorney, why he had fent copies of thefe allegations to all the Chief Judges of the feveral Courts, except to himfelf; he answered that he did it by advice of his Countel .- His Lord hip moved a refolution, touching the testimony to be received from the allegations and final fentence of the Ecclefisftical Court, before their Lordships, on an appeale which was unanimoufly carried, and ordered that copies of the Relolution be fent to all the

Chief Judges. It is with heartfelt pleafure we have it in our power, this day, to announce with a moral certainty the termination of a famine, that in addition to the other calamities which this country recently fuffered has afflicted it to a lamentable degree: One cargo of wheat, confisting of two thousand five hundred barrels, from America, has just been landed and offered for fale; three other cargoes are hourly expected from the fame quarter, and a like number from Danigic are on their way, without reckoning the quantities daily expedied from the overflowing of the glut of corn and flour landed at Belfalt. Old potatoes fell yesterday afternoon to feven shillings the hundred, and new potatoes were hawked at 6d. the pound.

The arrival of veffels laden with grain and flour from American ports at that of Belfast, has made a very fensible reduction in their respective prices, at that great trading town, as well as fome other parts of Ulfter for fome time paft, fo that by the late returns, we find the average rates are cheaper there than even in Waterford and

fome other parts of Muntter.
