

June 26. Last night arrived the Hamburg ship due on the 18th inst. but it brings no intelligence of any importance with which we are already acquainted.

No French Papers had arrived this evening. This morning came on in the Court of King's Bench, Westminster, the trial of James Hadfield, attempting to assassinate the King.—The defence went entirely to prove Hadfield insane at the time of his attack on the King, and the evidence was so convincing on this point, that at 5 o'clock, Lord Kenyon stopped the proceedings, observing, that the prisoner must be acquitted. The Jury acquitted him accordingly.

Eight thousand persons are said to have perished at Genoa, in consequence of famine.

The Purser and some Passengers from the East Indes, lately taken in a pilot boat by a French privateer near Portland Bill, arrived yesterday at Plymouth; One passenger had 3000l. in gold, of which, he has brought home 1000l.

One of the Russian Officers, now embarking on Guernsey, proves to be a female, and was lately delivered of a daughter.

Mr. Cooper.—From the Philadelphia Gazette of April last, it appears that Mr. Cooper, the assassin, formerly of Manchester, has been tried and convicted of Sedition.—The indictment consisted of the following passages, published in hand-bills, signed by Mr. Cooper—1st. That the President did not possess sufficient capacity to fulfil the duties of his office.—2d. That he had created a permanent navy.—3d. That a standing army had been created under his immediate auspices;—and 4th. That he had interfered with the judiciary of the United States, and caused Nathan Robbins to be delivered over for execution, to an unrelenting military tribunal.

Mr. Cooper read numerous passages in his defence, and continued reading until exhausted, and unable to proceed. The Jury in a few minutes returned their verdict—GUILTY. The Court then allowed Mr. Cooper three days to prepare any thing he could offer in extenuation. On the appointed day, he was sentenced to pay a fine of 400 dollars, to suffer six months imprisonment, and to enter into bonds for his good behaviour for one year, himself in the sum of 500 dollars, and 2 sureties in 500 dollars each.

HOUSE OF LORDS.

Friday, June 27.

The order of the day having been read, viz. the third reading of the Compensation Bill. The Earl of FARNHAM rose, to state generally the number of objectionable points in the Bill while he professed his incapacity to determine which of them to solicit for particular amendment. The bill he said went in toto to impose an enormous sum in bulk imposed on the country, without specifying any one particular ground on which that general sum could be justly ascertained, or any distinct data for the rational application of it; why the sum of 1000l. to compensate the supposed losses of individuals for particular disfranchised boroughs, should be marked as the question of retribution reference to any other sum, without any possible calculation as to principle or specified loss, was to him inexplicable, and he could not bear asserting after a dispassionate and cool reason on the primary cause, the origin and progress of this bill, that the idea of corporate compensation to assiduously thrown out, was merely a fiction to cover the predetermined object of individual retribution.

The Lord Chancellor called the Noble Earl to order three times in the progress of an interrupted speech, first, for deviating from the principle of the bill—secondly, for reproving their Lordships for their conduct in the progress of it, he asked because they did not immediately adopt
