HOUSE OF COMMONS.
Monday, June 30.

The CHAN. of the EX. entered at great length into a general history of the canal navigations, for which purpose he took a review of all the considerable works of that description throughout the world, our limits will not permit us to give any more of his speech than the substance of the concluding period, that Canal Directors are to be appointed with salaries to be subject to the control of the Lords of the Treasury, and both under the direction of the Lord Lieutenant, he moved the following resolutions:

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this committee, that it is highly expedient that encouragement be given to the general system of inland navigation in Ireland by parliamentary grants, under such conditions and regulations as parliament shall think fit; and that the same should be especially applied to the opening a communication between Dublin and the river Shannon, and to the rendering the river Shannon navigable from Loughallen to the sea, provided the same can be done on terms just and reasonable between the public and the undertakers thereof.

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this committee, that it is highly expedient, in order to establish a further protection for the trade of the port of Dublin, that a sum be granted by Parliament to effect the object stated in the abovementioned report under such conditions and regulations as Parliament shall direct.

The resolutions were then agreed to, and Mr. Alexander directed to report them to the House.

The CHAN. of the EX. entered into a detail of the late loan which Mr. Luke White had relinquished. He also exculpated himself from entering into any compromise, which he understood he had been by some rumour charged with, with Mr. White, respecting a share in the new loan, purchased by Mr. Burroughs. He also submitted to the consideration of the Committee the expediency of obtaining as a forfeiture, not only the whole of Mr. White's first deposit, but also compelling him to pay his next engagement, the whole amounting to 125,000l. To this the Speaker objected in point of parliamentary form, and advised reporting progress, and sitting again, which was accordingly agreed on.

Tuesday, July 1.
Several bills having been read a third time and passed, the house resolved into committee on the bill for relief of insolvent debtors, and the names of some persons, not originally described by the bill, were admitted to its benefits, after which the house refused and the report was ordered to be received to-morrow.

Lord CASTLEREAGH delivered a message from his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, stating the loan transaction with L. White Esq; the forfeiture of that gentleman's first deposit, and requesting the advice of the house as to the manner in which the said deposit of 75,000l. might be applied to the public service.

The message was ordered to be entered on the journals of the house and referred to a committee of ways and means.

The CHAN. of the EX. then moved that the house for with reference to the said committee, and a debate arose, different in no novel feature from what had been advanced the preceding evening on the subject.—The house having accordingly resolved into a committee of ways and
