Court of Exchaquer-July 25.

This was an action brought by Patrick Lartin, Efq; sgaint Mr. John Milliken of Graffon-treet, bookfeller, for publishing a libel againt the plaintiff, in a book, entitled, "A Fair Representation of the prefent Political State of Ireland, in a courle of Sirictures on two Pamphlets, one enritled, The Cafe of Ireland, &c. &c. by Patrick Duigenan, L L. D'

A most respectable Special Jury having been fworn, Mr. Curran flated the cafe for the plainsiff, which appeared to be as follows: Amongst a number of pamphlers publified on the fubject of Union, the plaintiff Lattin had written one anonymously, under the title of "The Cale of Ire-land re-considered 3" in answer to which the book published by the defendant had been written, charging the author of the Cafe of Ireland with having ferved in the armies of France, and being thus guilty of High Treason against his lawful Sovereign.

It was proved by a man named John Manghan, that the book called " A Fair Representation, had been purchased at the shop of the defendant

on the 221 of Feb. laft.

Mr. Richard Strange fwore, that he knew the Plaintiff, Latin, to be the Author of "The Cafe of Ireland reconfidered;" that Lattin had told him he was fo, and had confulred him about the title ; and that Lattin was generally reputed the Author of that work. On his crofs-examination, he faid he was himfelf a Roman Catholie ; that he had been active in focieries for emaccipation; that he believed the controverly in these books turned on that subject; that he had advised Lattin to call his book " The Case of Ireland," from recollecting a book during the American war called "The Cafe of America," and confidering the circumstances of the two of America having effected a separation. He had known the Plaintiff to be in the service of the King of France, but he knew he had a licence for that purpole-fihe licence was produced, bearing date in 1786]-had heard that he fought in the armies of France when at war, with England, and believed that he was Aid-decamp to a French General in the American war. Had heard that Lattin ferved notice on Wright the London publisher of this book that he was the author, but did not know who gave him that notice; could not fay whether Milikin had any such notice; had heard of many pamphlets published anonymously, but had always heard fome authors name arrribured to them. Does nor know whether Lattin was in the French fervice in 1791, but believes he fought at the flege of Life in 1792.

Thomas Dillon, a Captain in the fervice of the late Prench King, proved that he knew the plaintiff to be the reputed author of " The Cafe of Ireland;" that he knew him to have been in the French fervice from 1786 to 1788-never knew him to be in the King of England's fervice. And being asked wherher he knew the plaintiff to have offered his fervices to the Government during the late rebellion in Ireland, he asswered

Oh Lord, no. Major Underwood faid, he had known the plainciff at L Ge in 1792, as a private gentleman, and not as a military officer-he never knew him beforut the day Gen. Dillon was murdered

Mr. James Moore, bookfeller, fwore, that he had published "The Cafe of Ireland," from an English copy, farnished to him by Mr. Dillon of Parliament freet-that he confidered the pamphles as a Cathelie pampoler, but could not fay

thor, to flow that he was by the nature of his fituation an enemy to the Protestant establishment of Ireland; that the author had known nothing of this Lattin appeared by the plaintiff's own witnelles: it also appeared that the verdict in England was founded rather upon the circumstance of the printer's continuing to publish the libel after the plaintiff had given him notice that he was the person alluded to, than from any thing like what appeared in the prefent cafe.

The learned Counsel having at great length

enforced thefe topics of defence,

The Court charged the Jury, leaving to them all the circumstances of the case, the several matters of extenuation, and the conduct of the plaintiff, who had already received compensation for any injury he might have received, and who appeared to have not only reforted to the law, but to have taken upon him his own cause by publishing an answer to the erry book of which he complained. [This book, which was offered in evidence, and proved by Strange, the plaintiff's witness, was, after fome contest on the part of Mr. Lattin's Counfel, allowed to go to the Jury.]-The altered edition of the 'Pair Reprefentation' being offered by the Defendant's Counfel, was not permitted by the Counfel for the plaintiff to go before the Jury

The Jury returned a verdict of 6d. damages,

and 6d. cofts.
