

DUBLIN-CASTLE, Aug. 6. 1800.

His Majesty has been pleased to grant the dignities of Viscount Rowland and Earl O'Neil to St. John Viscount O'Neil, of Shanes-Castle, in the county of Antrim, and to his heirs male.

Also the dignities of Viscount Bernard and Earl of Bandon of Bandon-bridge, in the County of Cork, to Francis, Viscount Bandon, and to his heirs male; and the letters patent are preparing accordingly.

Within about ten miles of Bray, adjoining the sea-coast road leading to that town, there is a tract of land, containing in the whole about 70 acres, entirely under wheat, the reaping of which commenced the present week, and that in a situation where corn had not been sown in the memory of the oldest inhabitants of that neighbourhood, and all in the vicinities of which, on every side, are fields of potatoes, which before had been always under pasture; so that every account from various parts of the country confirm one important fact, which is, the great extension of tillage, with the pleasing prospect of the most abundant crops.

The trial of Archer Wallace, of Carlow, commenced on Tuesday morning at ten o'clock, before the Right Hon. Lord Kilwarden and a very respectable Jury. The prisoner seemed to entertain very little apprehension, and appeared anxious that his trial should be first proceeded on.

There were no less than 16 witnesses examined on the part of the Crown, whose evidence clearly and circumstantially established the facts stated in the indictment. It appeared that in consequence of some suspicion being attached to the prisoner's conduct, at the General P.M. Office, a certain bank note was particularly marked, by several of its principal officers, and put into a letter which was conveyed to Carlow, and then put into the Post Office of that town. When the mail fell off for Dublin, it was met by a gentleman near Carlow, who on examining the Carlow bag, discovered that the note so marked had been taken out of the letter which contained it. Mr. Wallace was therefore apprehended, and Major Swan found the identical note upon his person, in an inside waistcoat pocket, on which he was committed by that gentleman to Carlow goal.

The defence set up by the prisoner, was that he had taken the note for valuable consideration from a person; he did not know. That he was, exclusive of being post-master of that town, stamp register also, and very extensive in business as an Apothecary; that he was a man of considerable property, and until the present accusation, bore an unsullied reputation, highly respected by all his neighbours. He had given for the note stamps to the amount of two guineas, and the remainder in bank notes; and it was not likely that a man circumstanced as he was, in affluence and general estimation, would descend for a paltry consideration to the commission of such a crime.

It was fully proved that Mr. Wallace was in a very extensive line of business, and in opulent circumstances. Mr. Billeau, and his partner, from Dublin, testified that from the quantity of drugs he had been in the habit of getting from their house, the bills of which were produced, he must be in extensive trade. A number of witnesses of the first respectability were examined as to his character, who all agreed that till the present affair he always bore the character of an honest man, and of exemplary conduct.

The trial lasted eleven hours, when after a candid and impartial charge given by Lord Kilwarden, the Jury brought in their verdict, — Guilty.
