DUBLIN, SEPTEMBER 29.

Italy, though the most fertile and beautiful region in Europe, is likely to become once more the prey of contending armies. The French, we are informed, have ordered the harvest to be gathered in for themselves in those parts which they hold possession of, while the Austrians, no doubt, have done the same in those tracts possessed by their armies, while the inhabitants must experience the most deplorable distress. As the renewal of the horrors of war on the Continent seems almost inevitable, the plains of Germany must share the like fate, and the people be again reduced to the most abject state of misery and wretchedness, internal trade nearly annihilated, and complicated distresses pervade the greater part of the Empire.

Thursday large parties of the Oxfordshire and Romney fencible cavalry, lately disbanded, marched into this city, on their return to Great Britain.

Same day, several hundred grey horses from the different disbanded regiments of fencible cavalry, were shipped for England.

A collier is sunk near the Pigeon-hole. The Industry of Bolton, Bradford, from Lisbon, was driven from her moorings in the gale of Thursday and got upon the North Bull, where she still remains upright, and does not appear to be sunk; there were also two other large vessels with 5000 tons of distress flying.—No vessel in the Bay.

Waterford, Sept. 25. Friday last was tried in the City Court-House, Cork, before the Right Worshipful the Mayor and the Recorder, a revenue case, wherein the late Contractor for lighting that city was defendant; he having dis-trained the plaintiff's goods for arrears of lamp-money, due during his contract;—when his Worship, after hearing evidence and counsel on both sides, with the concurrence of the Recorder, made an order for sale of the plaintiff's goods to the amount of the several rates due to the defendant, unless immediately redeemed.

27.] On Sunday evening the West India fleet, which sailed from Cork the 15th inst., returned to Cove, driven back by contrary winds.

Saturday three companies of the North Mayo Militia, passed through Kilkenny, from Carrick-on-Suir, on their way to Granard.—A division of the Waterford Militia, we hear, is now doing duty at Carrick-on-Suir.

Chmuel, Sept. 27. We are credibly informed that 8000 troops are immediately to be sent from Great Britain, for the defence of this country, and to make up for the fencible regiments that have been disbanded.

Emmis, Sept. 30. Saturday last was committed to gaol, by Laurence Conyn, Esq; Denis Grady, charged upon the oath of Patrick Morrill, with having with five or six other persons to him unknown, burglariously and feloniously broke open the informant's house at Ballybeg, in this county, on the night of Thursday the 25th inst., and feloniously taking thereout cash and bank notes to the amount of 43l. 15s. 10d., together with 18s. 6d. clothing, which informant's wife had in her chest. Yesterday was committed, by said Magistrate, Ben Burke, charged with being strongly suspected as one of the party who robbed the house the said Patrick Morrill.

Same day Cornelius Ryan, of Partane, was brought in by a party of the Loyal Effick Fencibles;—and yesterday Luke Gleeson and Michael Hogan, of Pedamwe, were brought in by a party of the Close Regiment, and lodged in our County Cells, charged with rebellious practices.
