The three Culprits, mentioned in our last, were executed near the Village of Cullen, on Thursday evening :- Four of the five Men who were feateneed to be flogged, received each 75 lashes only, Sir James Duff having, with his wonted humanity, remitted the remaieder of 500. -Connor Ryan was not flogged :- The bodies of the two Roaches and Thomas Ryan, were interred near the Gaol of Tipperary.
