

O'Daniel, Timothy. *General Court-Martial*, the 30th ult. of confounding the murder of Roger and James Sheehy; Healy is to be executed on Monday next at Bruff.—O'Daniel and M'Mabon, at or near Kilshegan, same day.

Letters were received last Post at the Bank of Limerick, from India, which mention, that in May last James Daly, Esq. died at Madras: Mr. Daly was a native of this City, from which he went a few years ago; though a young man, he soon became a respectable Merchant in India, and an Alderman of Madras—and is supposed to have left a Fortune of 40,000. which he acquired with the strictest honor; his death must be sincerely lamented, particularly by the number of acquaintances from this City and Vicinity, who frequently experienced his liberality and friendship in a manner that does credit to his memory.

The names of the Labourers who we stated in our last, to have been tortured in a manner that would have scarcely entered into the imagination of the most uncivilized Savages, are Dan. Doe and Timothy Harnett, both of Ratoe, Co. of Kerry;—the horrid &c. of their backs and breasts being literally torn with Woollen Cards, took place at Berna, in this County, on the night of the 31st ult.—We have not been disappointed in our expectations, of that most vigilant and deserving character, the KNIGHT of GLIN,—it was impossible that the perpetrators of so foul a deed could remain with impunity in his neighbourhood: he apprehended on Saturday last Timothy Mulcahy and James Mulcahy, both of Berna, against whom the wretched sufferers lodged positive informations; and on Sunday night last, the two delinquents were brought up from Glin by a party of the KNIGHT's Infantry Corps, and lodged in our County Goal—Doe and Harnett accompanied the escort, and are now in town to prosecute.

Yesterday the General Court-Martial of which Major Vandeleur is President, resumed its sitting in the County Court, when they tried Roger Ryan and Wm. Ryan, for being out at an unreasonable hour on the 25th of May last, at Kilsheppa in the Co. Tipperary, and compelling one Denis Ryan to sell them his Potatoes at a rate considerably under the common price, in consequence of the dread said Denis Ryan was in from a flogging inflicted on him the night before by persons unknown. Sentence not known.—The Court adjourned to Thursday next, when the prisoners sent in by the Knight of Glin, will be put on Trial.
