

General Abercrombie were to sail for Alexandria the 28th of January; the force consisted about 17,000 men, all in good health and spirits. Lord Keith had seven sail of the line, and frigates. The first division of transports, consisting of about twenty sail, left Smyrna on 28th of January, under convoy of the Vizier's brig. It is supposed they put into Miletus, near Mecelyn, as the wind continued for three or four days to the southward. The transports left at Smyrna, were expected to be ready first week in February, and then to sail under convoy of the Vizier's transports; they were provided with forage, and the rest fitted up as horse mule traps.

A report was circulated at Smyrna, that French troops had reached Alexandria, and landed—but this was not credible; others said, with little foundation, they had landed at Bergassi. The plague had broke out in the Vizier's Army (already much reduced by desertion) at Jaffa. General Koehler and his wife had fallen sick to it. The French in Egypt had declared they would withstand every attack the English might make.

Capt. Lee saw nothing but his way to Maltese, except a Greek brig from Malta to Patras, who assured him the Alexander was of war and Pompey frigate were at Malta.

There is a rumour that the Kent had been fired and re-captured.

Yesterday Lord Loughborough took leave of Court of Chancery, and this day he resigned his situation as Chancellor.

13. The Irish Martial Law Bill has passed the Imperial House of Commons, after a long discussion, in which Sir John Parnell, Sir Francis Burdett, Mr. Horne Tooke, and Mr. Whibbread warmly disapproved of the enacting of the bill; Francis Burdett having alluded to the well-known affair of Woolleghan, drew up Lord Clarendon, who vindicated the character of the Earl of Enniskillen, (President of the Court-Martial which acquitted Woolleghan.)

The Irish Habeas Corpus Suspension Bill, and Irish Master of the Rolls Bill having passed Commons, were, as well as the above-meant Bill laid before the Lords, where they were read a first and second time, and ordered to be committed for Monday.

Mr. Isaac Corry moved for the 3d reading of Bill for prohibiting the use of Malt in the distilleries in Ireland—Read a third time, and agreed to the Lords. The Irish Duty Bill was read a third time and passed.

At the Peers, on Lord Walsingham's suggestion Printer of the Morning Herald was ordered to stand at the bar, for misrepresenting part of proceedings of the preceding day (Saturday). The Lord Chancellor, on this occasion, desired it to be a high branch of the law.

On Tuesday night last, a number of men with their faces blackened, broke into the house of Denis Daunelly, of Lisnagry, in the liberties of this city, and of one M'Namara, of Sallymount, in the same neighbourhood, violently assaulted the former, and robbed both of considerable money and goods; we understand the principals are known.

On Wednesday night last, the 25th instant, an Officer's Servant brought a Forged Note of three Guineas on the Bank of Limerick, to Mrs. Uthank's, opposite the Main-Guard, he purchased some Lame Handkerchiefs, and got the remainder of the change:—Mrs. Uthank is confident, if any Gentleman of the Guard finds out the circumstance, he will give her information.

On Wednesday last the Revenue Officers of Newport, lodged in the King's Stores here, two private Stills and vats full, which they seized a few nights before: one of them containing 150 gallons, was detected at full work in the Copper Mine Mountain, near that Village. It is but justice to say that this service was completed by the assistance of a detachment of the Quada and Acre Cavalry, under the command of Lieutenant John Evans, of Acre, whose unremitted attention to the support of the Law of their Country, deservedly entitles them to its best praise.

Yesterday Charles Conyers, jun. Esq. Chairman of a Record Jury, gave Mr. Weston Two Guineas for the use of the Poor House.

The Business in the City Court ended this evening, and proved Maiden:—A trial for murder was going on in the County Court when this Paper went to Press.
