Force of the French in Egypt, according to the information in our possession, is about 15,000 men including the Native troops.

Letters from Birmingham, we are concerned to bring us intelligence of a riot there on Friday last. A good deal of mischief was done before the dragoons could assemble, several shops, as well as cheese and flour shops, were broken open, and their contents carried off.

The appearance of the military soon dispersed the mob, which was very formidable in numbers. Several of the rioters were seized and tranquility was re-established.

On Saturday, in the House of Commons, Mr. Fox gave notice, that it was found expedient to bring forward resolutions respecting the Ways and Means of Ireland, from Monday next.—Mr. Grey also gave notice, that the House do resolve itself into a Committee, to enquire into the State of the Affairs of Ireland, which brought forward a long and interesting Debate, in which Mr. Fox, in the course of three hours, highly censured the Administration of Ministers—and Mr. Pitt explained the Motion in the morning the House divided, for Mr. Grey's motion 105, against it 291.

The Alceto fire-ship returned to Leith on Monday morning, in consequence of her having sprung a leak, left the fleet under Sir H. Parker, on the 15th inst. all well off the Scaw.—The Lieutenant of the Alceto gives it as his opinion, that the whole of the fleet would be ready to sail for Copenhagen on the following Tuesday or Wednesday.

This prosecution was avowed by Mr. Bruce in Court to be carried on, not for the purpose of punishing the unfortunate prisoners, who, he well knew, acted under the orders of their Superiors, but to shew Magistrates that they still for Military protection to support of unlawful authority at their peril: Mr. Justice Day fully stated the law, and objected to the execution of the prisoners, either the orders of a Magistrate or General for such illegal conduct. We hope to give to the Public the Judge's solemn Charge on this subject, as it must prevent any further impediment to the free transport of Potatoes from one part of the kingdom to any other part of it.

Saturday evening the Assizes ended, and next morning the Judge set out for Tralee.

In the County Court, Maurice Hoare and John Hoare for uttering forged Bank Notes, were sentenced to be hanged:—these two men were convicted at the last Assizes, upon evidence that the signatures were marked from a copper-plate and not by hand-writing, and this not being conformable to the usual proofs of a forgery, namely, by the witness swearing that he was acquainted with the hand-writing of the person supposed to have signed the note, and that the signature was not of his hand-writing; the Judge, who tried the prisoners, respited judgment, until the opinion of the Twelve Judges, whom on consultation over-ruled the point saved.

Patrick Doorty, John Makasy, Patrick Leahy, and Thomas Leahy, for a burglary and larceny in the dwelling-house of James Barry, at Abernabrock, to be hanged.

John Mullane and Thomas Dinahen, for stealing Potatoes, were burned on their hands.

Stephen Brow, for the murder of the Roland's at Manister, to be hanged.

James Kennelly, for having a forged note in his possession, with intention of uttering it, to be imprisoned twelve months, and give security for his good behaviour.

Andrew Mortill, for feloniously robbing in a dwelling-house, to be hanged, but respited.

Four persons consisted of forcibly taking pot-atoes from strangers who had come into their parish to purchase them, were fined, but it appearing they offended by mistaking the Law on that head, their fines were reduced.
