Notice is hereby given, that the Limerick
Mail Coach was attacked last night, about the
hour of 11 o'clock, at a place called Cherry-hill,
between Monastereven and Kildare, by a number
of armed men, who fired upon the Escort and
Coach, killed one Passenger and one Horse, and
wounded three Horses, they then carried off the
Post-Bags, which should have arrived this morn-
ing from the following towns, viz. Burrish-
Ossory, Emo, Limerick, Maryborough, Monas-
tereven, Montrath, Nenagh, and Roscrea.
