

HOUSE OF LORDS.

Thursday, July 2.

At half past three o'clock, the Earl of Chatham, and the Earl of Rofslin, (who, as well as the Lord Chancellor, were their robes of state,) and his Majesty's Commissioners, on the Throne.—The Commons, a considerable number, with the Lord Mayor, forthwith appeared at the Royal Assent had been duly delivered. The Bills named in the Commission, were read, by command, and in the name of his Majesty, addressed the following resolutions of Parliament:

Resolved, That the Commons doth, in Command from his Majesty, that on account of the advanced season, and the state of public business, doth relieve you from a long session of Parliament.

Resolved, That the Commons doth highly commend the wisdom, prudence, and sagacity, which have marked all your proceedings, and particularly acknowledges the zeal with which you have pursued the important subjects of your consideration, in consequence of the pressure occasioned by the high price of provisions. The beneficial effects of the measures suggested for the alleviation of the distress, have afforded his Majesty great satisfaction, and he has the utmost satisfaction in hoping that, under the favour of the Blessings of Plenty will be reproduced of the ensuing Harvest.

Resolved, That the Commons doth, in the name of his Majesty, has directed us to return you our thanks, for the liberal Provision made for the various branches of the Public Service. While he regrets the necessity of such a large, it is a Relief to his Majesty, that the Resources and industry of the Country have enabled to support the Public Burthens in such a manner, with as little severity as possible, on the most important subjects.

Resolved, That the Commons doth, in the name of his Majesty, doth, with great satisfaction, and repeated successes of his Majesty's arms, by Sea and Land, important as the consequences, are not to his Majesty's mind, as affording decisive proofs of that vigorous and steady perseverance, which distinguish the national character: and that the chief reliance must be placed on the British Arms, and for confidence and security in the future Events so honourable to the British Arms, at the present moment, peculiarly to his Majesty's estimation, from the illustrious attainment of the great and glorious victory, the Battle of...

I have much pleasure in executing Sir William Meadows' commands, by acquainting you for the information of the 1st and 2d Battalions of the 46th Regiment of Foot, that he has received His Royal Highness the Commander in Chief's directions to communicate his thanks to the two Battalions, for their very Spirited and Loyal Offer to extend their Service to any part of the World; which His Royal Highness will not fail to lay before His Majesty.
