the account of Gantheaume's landing
 in Egypt has hitherto been ex-
 ceedingly exaggerated. The French accounts, we
 are told, exaggerate the number of men
 landed by Gantheaume. We are ignorant, indeed,
 of the number of the transports he had under
 his command, but, from the statement of his
 arrival in a letter from Messina, he
 could not have above 4000 land troops with him,
 and not more than four ships of the line.
 His reinforcement would doubtless be very
 small, were the contest in Egypt equally
 decided; it would have been of infinite con-
 sequence, and perhaps decisive, had it arrived
 in our army; but at present the French
 are reduced in spirit and numbers—they
 are surrounded on every side; the assaults
 are incessant, from the enemy's weakness, so
 as to prevent their measures, and to act against them
 on many points as to reduce them by partial
 attacks, and to cut them off by intercepting
 their communications. Besides the French
 ships, as well as men, and they will soon, it
 is believed, want provisions at Alexandria. The
 arrival of 4000 men there, if unexpected by
 the enemy, might perhaps embolden the enemy to
 attempt a surprise on our position at Aboukir,
 a post, however, is considered very strong
 not only by works that have been raised, but
 by the inundation of the country: If that position
 were to fall, Menou may perhaps make a forced
 march up the country, and attempt to strike
 against the combined forces, which, after
 the late victory of the Turks, under the Grand
 Vizier, would block up the French in Cairo.
 We nevertheless think, that unless the French
 are lucky enough to do something by surprise,
 their reinforcements they have received are not
 likely to turn the scale in their favour, for
 we must suppose they have received by
 Gantheaume's squadron a reinforcement of 5000
 or 8000 men.—Neither indeed do we consider
 it absolutely certain that Gantheaume has
 landed his troops, though it now appears very
 probable.
 It should turn out true that Gantheaume
 landed reinforcements, the utmost vigilance
 on the part of our government and of our naval Commanders
 will be necessary to prevent a second attempt
 being successful. In all probability Admiral
 Boscawen intends to carry with him from Odiz some
 of the Spanish ships there, with French rein-
 forcements for Menou. If another cargo were
 safely landed it might change the face of
 the war.
 It was reported at Bristol on Wednesday eve-
 ning that a frigate from Alexandria with advices
 dated the 25th June, had arrived that morning
 at Plymouth.

The sage politicians of the London Stock Ex-
 change, on Thursday last, landed a French army
 at Beccles, in Suffolk. This was a clever exploit,
 considering that Beccles is an inland town.

On the 17th of July last, the long depending

 void from the beginning.
