

27]—We this day received Paris to the 22d inclusive, which however do any important intelligence.

War being ended with Portugal, the troops are now withdrawing, and about home to their own country.

Moniteur of the 23d contains a very of five columns from Rear-Admiral Captain General of Gaudaloupe, member of the Marine, dated Palais de la Paix, July 4th. In this letter Admiral speaks of an action which took place on the 1st of May between the Coeuvre French and the Andromeda, Captain Bradby, and the Siegalante, in which Captain Bradby, and several others are stated to have been killed. The remainder was not taken. The remaining part of the letter relates to the state of the colony of Gaudaloupe, and is accompanied by several Proclamations and Addresses from the Admiralty at that island.

The market experienced a considerable rise this day. We know not whether it was occasioned by the great rise in the French funds, or by the negotiation having taken a more favourable turn.

Two American frigates, and a cutter, arrived at Gibraltar, the 30th June.

The Margravine of Anspach has just arrived from Calais. As a special Act of the French allowed a passage to come to her Serene Highness.

Today being the anniversary of the festival of St. Louis, the day was observed by the emigrant Nobility and Clergy with all the pomp due to the occasion. High Mass was performed in the Chapel dedicated to St. Louis, in St. George's-fields, at which Monsieur, Comte d'Artois, and the Prince de Condé—they were accompanied by Monsieur de Montmorin, *Garde Sceaux*, several of the dignitaries, among whom were the Bishops of Orléans and Uzès, and an infinite number of citizens, Commanders, and Officers of the Army and Marine—they were according to the custom, and the insignia of the order of St. Louis; and high mass was performed by the Bishop of Orléans, and the sermon was preached by Monsieur de Montmorin, the chaplain to the late King of France.

As usual, a panegyric on the virtues of the late King, and an exhortation to the auditors to be true to their duty.—An immense concourse of French and English were present. At the moment the Ex-princes made their appearance, they were received by their friends with every demonstration of respect and affection—every one vied in showing those attentions to Monsieur which they considered him entitled to from his illustrious birth and distinguished character. As he passed to and fro in the chapel, every Frenchman pulled off his hat.

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In announcing the following magnificent act, we apprehend that it will be conceived an efficaciousness that might be dispensed with on our part;—it, however, may stimulate to similar acts of Generosity;—The Hon. Mrs. Barron on her arrival in this city, appointed a Schoolmaster for the education of the Children of the Clare Regiment, at a Salary of 30l. per annum, and has given 100 Guineas for the Clothing of said Children.
