A useful pamphlet has lately appeared, on an important national subject—"The Culture of Potatoes."—If the directions laid down in it are attended to, 'tis probable that excellence might be greatly improved, and made generally useful.—For the benefit of our readers we select the following passage relative to the preservation of a winter

care should be taken to preserve the late crop from their great enemy the frost, but it is not to be set in previous to their being taken up, as are near the surface, and frost bitten, they are very carefully selected and thrown aside, and if they are intended to remain with the rest, they will, in the winter, become scalded, and so communicate corruption to many others, that the store will be greatly injured.

It should be taken out of the earth in the winter, with the soil about them. Such potatoes, which are found to be cut, must then be cut from those that are marketable, and the remainder, in a field prepared in the following manner:

In a pit in the side of a hill, three or four feet deep, sufficiently large to contain the potatoes, should be made, round which should be trench a few inches deeper than the pit, and that a wall of about two feet thick of earth should be left all round. On the declivity, a gutter, so that all the rain that fall should run freely from the trench. In this pit lay the potatoes, and if ashes, or sea sand can be obtained, cover each strata or layer of potatoes; and directed in preserving the seed.—But as there is a difficulty in procuring these, this method must of necessity be dispensed with, in the general. When the pit is filled to the top, pile up the residue in a manner resembling the roof of a house; this being done cover the potatoes with earth, the driest that can be obtained, at the very least, four inches in thickness, and the cover must then be thatched with reed or straw, thicker than a stack of corn is thatched,
