

A certain deposit to be made by the purchaser immediately, and the remaining sums to be paid at given periods. A liberal discount to be allowed on prompt payment, and the receipts to be transferable in the same manner that scrips are transferred. The growing land tax to be received by Government until the whole purchase-money is paid, when an abatement of one year was due from the date of the first instalment of land tax receipts is to be returned. The tax not purchased is said to amount to a sum equal to forty millions of three per cent. It is very natural to conclude, that every purchaser of land tax will endeavour to become the purchaser of it, particularly when he finds it is to be sold to public sale, and subject to the control of another individual. Each purchaser of land tax is said, is to be entitled to all the advantages and privileges of a Freeholder.

In the other part of this Plan of Finance we intend to be the sale by Lottery of all the waste Lands, and others, on which no individual claim can be established. The tickets to be sold at one shilling each, and two prizes to one blank; no prize to be less than 500 acres, and none to be lower than a given number of tickets only to be issued in certain fixed periods, and these to express the value thus on sale; by which means the market for them will never be overloaded, and a sure prospect is expected to be found for them. The prospect of possessing a large tract of land for the sum of 100l. will it is thought, induce every man who can spare that sum to try his chance. Independently of thus easily throwing a large sum as this part of the plan is expected to produce into the hands of the Government, the very desirable object of reducing the price of provisions will thus, in a very great measure, be effected, as every man will be anxious to make the most of his land, and to bring it to the highest possible state of cultivation; we shall again see small farms scattered over the country, where at present there are nothing but waste commons.

The immense sums arising from these two schemes will, it is expected, not only render it unnecessary to borrow any more money, but they will throw into the hands of Government many millions sterling, voluntarily given, as it were, without any additional taxation.

A similar Plan for the relief of Ireland, as far as regards the waste lands, it is said, is also in a state of great forwardness.
