

our observation. We need not revert of this measure. The mode of its execution is still fresh in every one's recollection. till then, the First Consul assures us, we are established, or men of property permitted to undisturbed possession, or reduced to resume that spirit of enterprize which had suspended. On the impositions which have been made or are now going to be made on the internal situation of the country, the First Consul expatiates with peculiar complacency. The importance of many of these improvements must be convinced; and we can be convinced that the French are likely to derive more solid advantages from the extension of instruction, from the fortifications and the digging of canals, from the encouragements held out to commerce, and the improvements in agriculture, than from the deliberations of the Senate, the eloquence of the Tribunes, or the grave decisions of the Legislative Assembly. When we hear of the liberty which prevails in France, we are tempted involuntarily to inquire what evidences of that liberty are to be got? We have already heard a great deal of the flourishing situation of the French finances. In the language of the Republic, the First Consul speaks the same exulting language.

Speaking very slightly on the situation of the Republic, particularly the state of St. Domingo, the First Consul adverts with peculiar delicacy, he concludes his review by a few reflections on the external situation of the Republic. This, with respect to the Republic, is described as peculiarly satisfactory.—

The Republic is flourishing under its present auspices. Not a whisper of dissatisfaction has been heard! Liguria is penetrated with the First Consul for his protection and assistance. The subject of Switzerland might have excited a number of unpleasant recollections. A peace was sufficient, and with a common-place interest for their happiness, the situation of the Republic is dismissed, to give way for the more important prospect of Prussia co-operating with France in the German Indemnities, of Bavaria and Austria commencing the demolition of the Imperial House in Tuscany for a number of Bishops.

The First Consul speaks with confidence of the prospect of peace on the continent; he guarantees that the maritime peace, that is to say, the peace of England, will likewise be preserved. The First Consul takes into view the possible case in which the peace may not be fully carried into execution. In the event of any difficulty occurring in the fulfilment of treaties, it is plainly insinuated that the honour of France would be implicated in such conduct. It is said, however, that the government had received information that the British troops in Malta and Alexandria.

The French government is well founded in its opinion that Malta is to be evacuated, and we are glad to know what measures have been taken by both governments to obtain the guarantee.

Captain Dodd, Secretary to the Duke of Cornwall, is arrived in England, for the purpose of making a representation to government on the subject of eleven soldiers who have been sent home, after being tried by a Court Martial at Gibraltar, in consequence of the reluctance of his Royal Highness to have the sentence awarded against them carried into effect. The soldiers will be at the disposition of government.—When he left Gibraltar on the 31st of January the garrison were all well.
