

Holkar, and the Peishwa;—the latter, aided by a strong detachment of Scindea's troops, within miles of Poona, wherein the latter army, 50,000, was totally defeated, with immense slaughter. Major Dawe who commanded Scindea's troops, and one or two other European Officers, many Sirdars of distinction fell, and the army was completely dispersed. The Peishwa fled from Poona on the 10th day, and are got into the hill fort of Raighu, near Bancoot. Holkar's Pindarees entered Poona, and began to plunder, but were recalled before they could do much mischief. This is a precious morsel presented for their master, who will, no doubt, levy a heavy contribution. The battle was fought so near the village of Sungum, that Colonel Close was obliged to send a messenger to Holkar, desiring him to respect the British flag, which was complied with; but Close, and the whole of his suite, has now left Poona, and is on his way to Bengal. What may be the result of this, I know not, but think it likely that the Peishwa, instead of having our assistance forced upon him, may now become a suppliant, and pay handsomely for it. The Marquis has an eye to the coast, and it now becomes expedient for us to be possessed of it in some measure or other, so as to keep others out. A detachment is preparing here for service, to be under the command of Colonel Boscawen, but I rather think the object is the Pirates. We are, however, reinforcing the Guzzerah, and are otherwise prepared by a very strong army at Seraperabad; and General Wellesly can soon collect 10,000 men on the banks of the Toombudra."

This morning we received letters from Gibraltar so late a date as the 10th, which we here sub-

GIBRALTAR, March 7.—"On the 4th instant, the 23d regiment, or Welsh Fusiliers, were reviewed by his Royal Highness the Governor, on the Grand Parade, and notwithstanding the day was not favourable, it being very cold and windy, they went through all the eighteen manoeuvres in a very superior style, and the whole appearance and discipline of the regiment was highly to their honour. The officers dined with his Royal Highness."

"This morning a small sloop of about 20 tons arrived from Scilly, in 14 days, loaded with potatoes for the garrison, with only two men to navigate her. The novelty of such an attempt, at this late season of the year, excited very considerable surprise here."

"From the violent north west winds that have prevailed here lately, we are apprehensive the ships from Egypt will have a long passage."

"The garrison is remarkably healthy, and behaves with the utmost regularity and good conduct; no crimes or punishments are now uncommon among the soldiers; and it is worthy of remark, that since his Royal Highness has commanded the garrison, no officer has ever been brought to a general court-martial, whereas formerly seldom a month elapsed without one being necessary.—There is no drinking to excess amongst the officers, and gaming, which is a great source of mischief and disputes, is entirely unknown here. The officers are now going to give acting plays, which his Royal Highness encourages and patronises."

"Yesterday morning the Greyhound sailed for England, and got through the Straights before
