Extract of a letter from Plymouth, dated April 27. "Came in the Dreadnought, of 98 guns; with 1000 Sheerness, and anchored in Cawsand Bay. On the morning arrived the Dutch National brig of the Scho, of 16 guns, Captain Van Kervil, from the Cape: she sailed from thence the 16th October, and touched at the Cape of Good Hope, where she left the 1st February, and it was long time in possession of the English: General Boscawen was also there, but his Lady had sailed for the Continent. She left at the Cape the Lancaster, of 54 guns, Vice-Admiral Sir R. Curtis; Hind, of 54 guns, Captain Le Gros; Jupiter, of 40 guns, Captain Lofack; the Penguin of 18 guns in M'Farlane; and another sloop of war."

THE LATE DUEL.—The Bills of Indictment for the murder, presented to the Grand Jury at Hicks's Hall, against Captain Macnamara, Surgeon Heavyside, and the Seconds in the late duel (who were included in one Bill), have been thrown out; and we understand it is intended to indict those gentlemen on the charge of Manslaughter, according to the verdict of the Coroner's inquest.

The following are the names of the principal witnesses who were yesterday examined before the Grand Jury:—

William Blackman, an officer of the parish, who was the prosecutor; the Hon. J. Duff; J. Macnamara, Esq; Stephen and William Sloane, Esqrs. James Smith, Esq; Mr. James Harding, Lord Barrington, Patrick Birmingham, Mr. D. Farrer, Esq; and Mr. Andrews, the Surgeon: in consequence of the decision of the Grand Jury, Mr. Heavyside was last night discharged from prison.

Captain Macnamara was a great deal better yesterday. There was no bulletin left of health as usual.

Mr. Steele's Murder.—The different reports which have circulated respecting the miscreants who murdered the unfortunate Mr. Steele, appear to have been corrected from the following particulars communicated to Mr. Steele's family in Catherine-street, by Isaac Clayton, the Constable of Hounslow.

This is to certify, that Richard Davis, of the parish of Isleworth, came and informed me, Isaac Clayton, that on Thursday before the Saturday last, Mr. Steele was murdered, Robert Newton did the deed, near the Powder Mills Bridge, on Hounslow Heath, the above mentioned Davis, with one of his brothers. He says, you old rogue, have you not all your necessaries? Have you got twenty pounds in money? He replied, No. Newton then took his hand in his pocket, and pulled out a leather bag, and said, Damn you, damn you, damn you.

Richard Daly, and others, charged on suspicion of stealing several half Bank Notes from ——— Hanuan, Esq; on the night previous, and of having the said Notes found in his possession. His appearance, address and manners, are those which a gentleman would exhibit.

Waterford, April 23.—Arrived here in distress, with the loss of masts, tables, and anchors, the brig Union, of Cork, Capt. Martin Long, laden with sugar, cotton, &c. from Barbadoes to Cork, after a passage of 49 days, during which time they experienced very severe weather, which fatigued the crew so much that two of them died, and the remainder are in a very bad state of health.

LIMERICK, APRIL 27.

Last week a man of polite address, and who passed for Richard Daly, Esq; a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy, swindled Robert and Thomas Westropp, Esqrs. merchants, in this city, of goods and cash to amount of 125l.—he also took a watch and a silver bowl from Mr. Wm. Fitzgerald, Jeweller;—he was pursued by one of Messrs. Westropp's Clerks, who apprehended him in Clonmel, the Coast of which town he was committed on Friday last;—it is now understood that his name is Edward Saul Jennings; and is also charged with stealing several half Bank Notes from a gentleman at Clonmel, on Thursday night.

Monday last, two troops of the 51st Light Dragoons, commanded by Capt. Lawson; arrived here on their way to Cashel, where they are to do duty till further orders. The two Frenchmen, deserters from the Queen's German Regiment, as mentioned in a former paper, were in charge of the above party, on their way to join their regiment at Cork.

Monday evening, Colonel Vereker, Member for this city, arrived here from London, where he had been attending his duty in the Imperial Parliament;—the fourth company of the Limerick Regiment, which he commands, is nearly completed.
