Commercial Advertiser, of the 2d April, reports that several transports, with troops, had arrived at Cape Francois. Some accounts say that the whole of the reinforcements to be sent to the seat of Government was to be re-embarked in a few days after Cap- tain C. left Cape Francois the 15th March.

Intelligence has been received from the West Indies, which states, that a serious standing prevails between General Mareschal and Vice President Melzi, who it is thought has been driven from his post. It is also said that General Rochambeau is about to depart from St. Domingo.

The whole number of ships cleared inwards during the year in England was, British built 11,100, tonnage of British 1,562,000; of foreign 434,174; the number of British seamen 3,902; foreign seamen 24,953. The number of ships outward was, in all respects, except as to the tonnage, very nearly the same. In the Exports and Imports in tonnage the number is the one-sixth of England, but the vessels are larger, and therefore amount to above one-fifth of the number.
