

in their adopting such measures as to them appear most advisable for carrying it into effect without delay.

Mr. of Ex. contented himself with moving that Majesty's Message be taken into consideration by a Committee of the whole House on Monday next. Ordered.

A bill for the encouragement of foreign sea-birds was read a third time and passed.

Mr. of Ex. moved the order of the day for the second reading of the new income tax bill.

Ferguson conceived, that the part of this bill which went to regulate the contribution of land tax, was a violation of the treaty of Union with that country.—[He had the article of that treaty which limits the land tax of Scotland to be read at the table]—He was satisfied with the result, and called the attention of the House to this subject.

The people of Scotland had no objection to contribute their full proportion of the expence of the war; but he submitted to the consideration of the House, whether it would not be better to regulate them in another way, rather than in a manner which appeared to violate this fundamental article of the instrument by which the countries were united.

Mr. Buxton considered the contribution on Scotland as a land tax, but as a contribution on property. When it was first mentioned to the House by the Right Hon. Friend (the Chan. of Ex.) it struck him as a new land tax, and on this point he should have opposed it, if upon explanation it was not made to appear to him in a different light.

Mr. Dundas considered this tax only as a tax on property, of which land was in this particular instance taken as the criterion. Though he was not disposed to acknowledge the advantage which Scotland derived from the Union, he should be the first to resist any departure from the treaty. He read a few lines more of the article alluded to, and said that it could never be the interest of Scotland to make Scotland contribute more than the circumstances of that country could bear. He concluded that a very just attention had been paid to the proportioning this in regulating the very contribution alluded to.

Mr. of Ex. stated that it was impossible there should be any wish to make Scotland pay more than her proportion. This was not a land tax, but a tax on property. His sentiments were so well supported by his Hon. Friends who went before him, that it was not necessary for him to say more. The bill was read a second time and committed for the third day.
