CAPITULATION.

The King of England having refused to ratify
Convention of Suhlingen, the Chief Consul has
himself obliged to consider that convention
I. In consequence Lieutenant-Gen. Mortier,
ander in Chief of the French army, and his

owing capitulation, which must be imme-
diately executed, without being of such a nature, as
submitted to the ratification of the two Con-
ents:

I. The Hanoverian army shall lay down
arms, which with all their artillery shall be
ed up to the French army.
II. All the horses of the Hanoverian Cavalry,

French army by one of the Members of the
Commission nominated by the Comman-
in Chief shall be immediately sent to make out

III. The Hanoverian army shall be disbanded;
