

General Brereton; but by the great energy and disposition made by Capt. Hallowell, in good order about two P. M. and by the assistance of every Officer and man employed the remainder of the troops, the Lieutenant was enabled to make an entry for an attack on that very important and Morne Fortalice, where the force of was assembled, which, on the Commanding to give up when summoned, was ordered to be attacked with that decision and promptness which has always been the characteristic mark of the late General Grenville, and carried by the assistance of the late Major-General, with the superiority which has ever distinguished the British; this placed the Colony completely in our power.

It is impossible for me to do justice to the merit of the late Major-General Hallowell's merit, as it is so generally known. I must beg leave to say, on this extraordinary activity could not be exceeded, and, by his advice, we have obtained the most effectual success, for which he has been a great and, after the final disembarkation, I am glad to see the seamen to co-operate with the marines of the Squadron, by desire of the late Gen. were landed and ordered to prevent supplies being sent to Padagon Island, which, on the fall of the late Gen. was delivered up. We are already in a re-embarking troops and other necessary for future operations. Capt. Littlehales, of the late Gen. is charged with the dispatch, whole I wish with much satisfaction acknowledge, to give their Lordships any further information.—I have the honor to be, &c.

Another Letter from Commodore Hood, dated the 25th June, 1803.

This morning I am under sail with Lieut. Grenville and troops, being Edward has in a very fine schooner or cutter, called the Pedigree, Citizen Victor Lefebvre, Lieut. Grenville, Commander, pierced for six guns, and from the Carrack the same evening was landed, with dispatch for the late Gen. The schooner was sent in chase of the late Gen. and did not capture her until after a 72 hours, during which time she threw all her stores on board; being a remarkable fast vessel, she is to be valued and purchased into our service, which I hope will meet their Lordships' approbation.—I have the honor to be, &c.

Wednesday evening Colonel Vereker, M. P. for this City, arrived in town, after attending his duty in the Imperial Parliament.

Thursday night, a route was received by Colonel Vereker, for his Regiment, the City of Limerick Militia, to march for Longford and Granard (instead of Bandon as was first intended)—they are to set out on Monday and Tuesday next.

The Escort to the Mail Coach has been very properly increased to twelve Dragoons, and is to be immediately extended the entire way from Dublin to Limerick. Detachments of the 12th Light Dragoons were yesterday stationed at Nenagh and Roscrea for this purpose.

The Cork Papers arrived this day mention that a number of respectable Persons are taken up in that City and County, on treasonable charges:—a Merchant who fled during the late Rebellion, and had arrived this week from Lisbon, was taken up by the High Sheriffs, on landing at Cork.
