The Bishop of Killaloe (Dr. Knox) is mentioned
as successor to the See of Kerry, vacant by
Bristol's decease; while the amiable and
respectable Dr. Lindsay (Lady Hardwicke's
son) is pointed out as the Bishop of Killaloe.
The appearance of the different Yeomanry corps
at the inspection which took place yesterday in St.
Stephen's-green, was, we understand, highly gra-
tifying to the Commander in Chief, and a number
of General Officers who attended in his suite;—
their numbers and military appearance, in so short
a period since the insurrection of the rebels in this
country, caused an evident sensation of ad-
miration in the veteran General.

It is due to some of the corps to make particu-
lar remark of the regularity of their appearance
at appointments—among those who held the first
rank in this respect were the Stephen's-green divi-
sion of infantry and cavalry, consisting of 1000
men, the infantry commanded by Capt. Exshaw,
and the cavalry by Captain Carleton.—The Artillery
commanded by Sir John Macartney.—The
Militia, the Linen-hall, the Lawyers, the Li-
brarians, the College, Rotunda, and Barrack
companies, the Grand Canal commanded by Captain
Murray, the Royal Dublin Infantry, Upper-Cross
companies, &c. &c.

We noticed several new corps, amongst whom
the Marine corps, commanded by Capt. Brabazon,
(commanding Captain of Dublin harbour,) and the
Royal Artillery Association, deserve particular men-
tion for their correctness.

The area of Stephen's-green the cavalry assem-
bled, consisting of the Lawyers, Artillery, Royal
Militia, Stephen's-green, Rotunda, Officers, Mer-
chants, South Coolock, &c.

The numbers in the gross returned to the Com-

dated by the one or the other, but shall meet the
conflict whenever it is necessary, with the con-
fidence which is the best pledge of success, and
which such a cause can never fail to inspire.
