of ammunition, &c.

This morning 20 sailors who had deserted from  
his Majesty's cutter Dart, commanded by Captain

escaping from the Tender, a party of the Kilrush  
Yeomen got a boat, pursued, and overtook the  
Deserters at Newtown-Sandes, in the Co. Kerry.
