

At Martinique nothing occurred. The Governor was in expectation of a visit from our troops. Those captains who have arrived last from the continent the fidelity of the inhabitants as to be very doubtful. So sensible was the Governor, that the prospect of an invasion of the island created the utmost uneasiness and apprehension. The troops were far from being either confident or confident of their ability to make resistance. It is mentioned that our vessels at Martinique has been to constantly be in almost every instance the attempt of American vessels to enter have failed. We have begun to experience the benefits of the return of the French political dominion. Since the capture of the Governor Brieron has issued a proclamation the conditions on which the importation of American produce will be regulated is drawn up in very liberal terms, which has given great satisfaction to the merchants. The principal trading towns of the United States are happy to find that the complaints in many instances were too justly punished by the treatment of American seamen and commanders on foreign stations during the late war, likely to be completely removed.—It is to be hoped, the utmost moderation has been observed in every instance where injury has been committed, there has appeared the disposition to give the earliest redress. This disposition which cannot fail to afford the satisfaction. With the mercantile interests the French Government is very far from unpopular; and if our naval superiority is maintained without insolence or oppression, there is no doubt that their sentiments on this subject will undergo a speedy change.

Subject of the Settlement of differences between the two nations, the following remarks are extracted from a correct source; and may be relied on:—"The 3,750,000 Dollars which the United States are to pay to the Citizens of the United States they have upon the French Government embraced by the Convention made the subject, by Messrs. Ellsworth and Davie. The article of the convention is to be null and void. The payment to the Citizens is to be made to the citizens thereof, after the final ratification of the late Convention by our Government, and exchange of which is to be done here; the payment by bills drawn by our Minister in Paris, in favor of the United States.—Claimants have their claims liquidated by the Government, on which claims they are to receive 6 per cent. per annum from the time the claimants respectively made their demands. After their claims are finally liquidated of three Commissioners, appointed by the Government, are to sit in Paris, who are to liquidate claims, to see if they promise that are embraced under the convention of the 30th Sept. As this is determined, the claimants are to present their drafts, and they will be paid as
