An epidemic disorder continues to rage at Paris:  
the number of deaths in the last month was  
quadruple of that in January, 1802.—This disorder is  
a catarrhal cough, accompanied by fever and  
spitting of blood. Several physicians ordered  
bleeding; but this, in almost every instance, proved  
fatal. The common people there call it "la Grippe"  
and attribute the contagion to the persons returned  
from St. Domingo.

A singular phenomenon was lately observed in  
the parish of Noa Koppernager, in the province  
of Delcaridia, in Sweden. At two in the evening  
the moon, at its full, was seen surrounded by  
black circles, inclosed in a circle of blood red.—From  
the east and west sides of the moon several rays  
appeared, which were prolonged to the circles, where  
two suns appeared distinctly, the one in the east, and  
the other in the west, having the colours of the rainbow,  
and emitting perpendicularly towards the horizon  
rays of light. In the heavens was seen a rainbow,  
which touched the circle round the moon, and  
the sides of which were also two suns of the  
same form as the other, but of a paler colour. This  
phenomenon embraced nearly the whole horizon,  
and continued for some time.

It is said that no less than a hundred and  
thousand pounds were offered to a man of considerable  
consequence in France, for the Diamonds which  
he had received as presents in Portugal. The offer  
was rejected as much beneath their value. The  
person who made this offer, however, judged it ne-  
cessary to return to this country, after it was known  
that he was capable of making so great a pecuniary
