The following interesting commercial information has been received at Amilerdam from Spain: by the Royal Confelar Tribunal was made known the Royal Council of Commerce at Catalogia the Royal order of Dec. 31 lait, and which was communicated by his Excellency Don Miguel Cayatano Solar, Secretary of State and of the General Bureau of Finances. It runs thus : in order to prevent all unpleasantness which the milinterpretation given in some custom-houses of Spain, to the Royal order of Nov. 19 last, may occasion, and in which is limited the obligation to exhibit certificates of the Confuls, confirming from whence the foreign merchandizes imported into Spain have their origin. So his Majesty has thought proper to declare that in the faid Royal Resolution, are not comprehended, at the time of issuing said Royal Order, nor within a month after its publication, the merchandize coming from Portugal, France, the united kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, Iralian, Batavian, and Swifs Republics; within two months those coming from the other European Potentates; and within four months those coming from the United States of America.

On Monday arrived at Portsmouth, his Majest ty's ship Castor, from the West Indies, on board of which Commodore Stopford of the Excellent, is come home. The command of his Majety's fhips and veffels in that quarter, is given to Cantain Hood, who is to furvey the Mand of Trinidad.
