The blockade of the Elbe will fall heavily on Hamburg and Denmark:—it will also press hard upon Prussia, especially should the Wejer be closed.—This measure may, perhaps, embroil us with the Northern Powers—but that is their fault; they have permitted, or encouraged France to pursue a course so hostile and dangerous to Britain, that the present measure becomes indispensable, and it will teach them what they have to expect, should they permit the French to seize upon the navigation of the Sound. The North of Europe will soon repent that ever they allowed the French to come into their neighbourhood.

Notwithstanding the many awful examples which has been recently made in this County, we are sorry to find they were not had the desired effect:—On Wednesday night last several Houses were broke open in the neighbourhood of Loughfield, in the Liberties of this City; the poor Occupiers taken out, and flogged, for no other crime than having worked under the prices fixed by their nominal Leader, CAPTAIN SLASHER.

Yesterday evening a young Man, of the name of Mulcahy, Farmer, riding from Limerick, was thrown from his horse, by a Pig running across the road near the Custom-gate on the Rosstown Road, and was killed on the spot.
