Their next object was the Magazine in the Park, where they only expected gun-powder; afterwards Dublin Cattle, at the fide of Ship-street, was to be attacked. Many other places were set down. Went to Rainsford-street on Saturday evening, having received a blunderbuss; from thence a number of people were proceeding in all directions for Thomas-freet; a few were armed with pikes, but the greater number were un-Mass-lane, near the Four Courts Marshalfea, where they received numbers of pikes, fire-aims and ammunition, having been conducted thither by a man whe offered them to numbers who complained they were not supplied with any weapons of desence. After this the winefs stated that he had retired to his own door in Francis-street, where he staid waiting for entrance until Justice Drury, with a guard, had feized on him, and committed him to prison.

Edward Wilson, Esq. chief peace-officer, and a magistrate of the County of Dublin, stated his having been sent out that night upon a strong charge from the Superintendant Magistrate, and substantiated, by his evidence, that part of the Attorney General's statement, which described his attacking a furious mo in the vicinity of Thomas-Areet, near Dirty-lane; his receiving a wound from the pike of a Rebel Lexier, whom he instantly shot dead.

Felix Brdy, a Lieut. and Adjutant of the 21st regt. proved hat he had the command of a party, confilting of bout 49 or 50 men, at the Barracks in Cork-stree from whence on imimation of a threatened rifig, on the night of the 23d of July, he went to infom the late Lieut. Colonel Browne, who then commanded in his regt. that a tumultuous mob had been in Thomas-street, which caused the military drums to eat to arms. A report had also prevailed that the foldiers were affaffinated in all directions, which aufed him to take a route with his party over one the bridges of the G. Canal, thro' James's-street. The night was extremely dark. The first suspicous person he met was a man standing alone in the iddle of Thomas-street with a pike, whom he feize Immediately after a bottle was thrown from a righhand window in Thomaswas thrown and a fhot was find from an entry, which wounded one of his part, who died on Saturday laft. Heard an huzza from few, and a tumultuous noise as of a mob proceeding towards him, whom he could not fee. His pay fired three vollies— after which they did not peede above five or fix perches when he saw, notwithanding the darkness, five men dead and one mandying, with a great

number of pikes lying near thm.

The prisoner's defence confisted of speech, at confiderable length, from his Counfel, Ir. C.
