The Commerce Tender, Lieut. Menzies, commander, arrived yesterday from Plymouth, where she had delivered to the Flag Ship, by order of Admiral Sir John Colpoys, K. B. 100 able-bodied Volunteers for his Majesty's Navy, raised at this port, by Capt. Warburton, and the Officers under his command. As soon as the Tender had come to her station at the Poole, ten new raised Volunteers were sent on board from the Rendezvous.
