

...of corn had been abundant beyond all precedent, and the agricultural state of the colony as, on the whole, improved to a most promising and gratifying degree.

A letter from St. Vincent, dated Dec. 12, 1804, says—"We are at present all in peace and quietness in this country, and every appearance of remaining so. The French privateers, which are alarming, are the only source of uneasiness to us at this moment, by annoying our Packets and Ships from Europe. An English armed ship, called Thetis, of Dominica, was lately attacked by Bonaparte privateer brig, off Barbadoes, who with such a warm reception from the Thetis, she was disabled completely, and made her fall the hands of one of our sloops of war a few days afterwards. Our sea and land forces in the West Indies are all much as usual, and, considering the climate, in as good health as can be expected.

The Lady of Sir Wm. Myers, our Commander, goes home to Europe by this Packet. I understand that there has been a good deal of sickness, and some mortality in the General's house, at Barbadoes."
