The Troops under orders for Foreign Service from Ire-
land are as follow:—2d, 3d, and 5th Dragoon Guards;
16th, 17th, 18th, and 23d Light Dragoons; 3d,
25th, 26th, 28th, 30th, 36th, 45th, 47th, 50th,
79th, 82d, and 97th Regiments Infantry.

We hear that a large body of troops from the Curragh
passed through Cloamel on Wednesday and Thursday, an
encampment was formed on Ballyspellan-hill, and the
troops were to proceed by New Birmingham, the property
of Sir Vere Hunt, Bart, to Mocklerstown, near Cashel.

Thursday last, 200 of the 1st Battalion 28th Regiment
of Foot marched thro' this City, from Birr, last from
the Curragh, for Doneraile, Charleville, &c.

Thursday last 170 Volunteers from the 2d Battalion of
79th or Cameronian Highlanders, who landed in Belfast
