LIMERICK, JANUARY 14, 1806.

A letter from a highly respectable character to a friend here, dated Dublin, 6 o'clock Sunday evening, and received by the Coach last night, is thus entitled—“that an express had arrived at the castle, stating Sir Thomas Duckworth, being in the right of the Rochefort Squadron, with an equal number of ships, seven each.”—We earnestly hope that their meeting will prove as decisive a victory, as Sir Richard Strahan's.

The Right Honourable the Lord Chancellor has been pleased to appoint Stephen Dickson, of Traigacurra, Esq. a Magistrate of this County. The 25th Regiment of Foot, have marched from Fermoy to Kilkenny. We hear the 82d Regiment, have received orders to march from Cork to Carlow. Last Sunday a most melancholy accident took place in Mary-street, occasioned thro' the neglect of those whose duty it was to take down the front of an old house, which had been presented a nuisance some time back. The front wall fell in about three o'clock, and painful to relate, Mr. O'Keefe, of Broad-street, shop-keeper, who happened to be passing, was buried in the ruins: and another man much bruised, (the report of his thighs being broken is unfounded).—The death of Mr. O'Keefe, is truly deplorable, being the father of a large family, and from his sudden and unexpected fate has left his affairs in a very unsettled manner.

There are a number of other houses in the city in a tottering situation, threatening instant death to every passenger, of which we caution the inhabitants of the following:—The small house at the corner of Baal's-Bride, not only a nuisance, but cramping the passage—the dismantled house next to Mr. Heoy's, in Mary-street, the most dangerous part still standing—a house covering three stalls in Meat-Market-street, which the neighbours avoid by going a round, but strangers are not apprised of—a house next below the old Jail—a house next to Mr. Storey's, John's-street—a house in West Water-gate, opposite the rear of the Assembly-House, allotted to a number of poor people—two or three in Castle-street—a house opposite the new Corn Market—a house opposite Mr. Lunham's, each maker—the house in which Mr. Carrol, chandler, lately lived—the bulk near the Skin Lane, George's-Quay—besides very many others, both in the main street and back lanes, too tedious to mention. Add to these the unprotected state of our Quays, without parapets, which should not, with convenience to the lauding of goods, there should be strong posts erected, and chains from post to post, as is the practice at Liverpool, and other trading cities in England.—We entertain no doubt but the paternal care of our chief Magistrate will obviate such fatal and deplorable occurrences in future.

handling guns, &c. occurred in Tralee.—William Casey, mason, on coming into his kitchen, observed a gun which he took up for the purpose, it is said, of removing it to a place of safety, and out of the reach of some children who were in the house; however, while in the act of putting this precautionary and laudable intention into effect, he, by some unaccountable fatality, or awkwardness in handling the piece, which was loaded with powder and shot, the contents were discharged, and the entire lodged immediately under the left arm of his daughter, who happened to be seated, with a child on her knee, at not more than the distance of a yard; the consequence, of course, was instant death. We regret to add, that she was the mother of four young children, and far advanced in a state of pregnancy.

On Monday night the 6th instant, Captain Cooke, of the Fethard cavalry, having heard that an armed banditti was to attack the house of Michael Heffernan, of Barretstown, near Fethard, to rob him of fire-arms, called on a few of his corps and a party of the 23d light dragoons, with which he proceeded on foot to the place, about three miles, and there concealed himself and his party in the out-offices, when shortly after they saw some of the villains approach the door, armed, about two o'clock at night, with a gun and blunderbuss, and without any ceremony, broke it open, and entered the house.—Captain Cooke, with some of the party, instantly rushed in and seized on three of the fellows, who were in the act of discharging their pieces at the party, tied them, and marched them into the guard house of Fethard, from whence they were committed to the jail of Clonmel, by Captain Cooke. The remainder of the banditti fled, on seeing the military by the light of the moon.
