Were we to have said a system of nightly depradation manifested itself in our County, we had applied an epithet perhaps merciless and not qualified by one or two excesses committed only by a few, and exciting the abhorrence, pursuit, and honest indignation of all, as well in the peasant as the magistrate.-However, as the magistracy stands committed for correcting violotions of the peace, we are to express an hope that those magistrates in that part of the county will, with that prompt vigilance, which marks their official character, adopt the most vigorous measures to ensure the apprehension of these wretches, teach them the inefficacy of contending against the law, and give us a fresh opportunity of saying, that amongst us each offence is chastised with appropriate severity.
