The thought is mean, destardly, and unworthy of a man, and consequently reprobated by the virtuous and enlightened pen of Dr. Young, in the following beautiful and comprehensive lines:

Nature's first wish is endless happiness } Annihilation is an after thought, A monstrous wish, unborn till virtue dies.
