The events of the late campaign have: leli Bonaparte without a single competitor on the Continent .--The capitulation of Ulm, and the battle of Austerlitz, have dissolved the mightiest combination ever formed for the resistance of immeasurable ambition. Both the moral and physical force of France, great as they were before, have been almost doubled by the peace of Presburgh; for the new Monarchies which have started up, and the whole of Italy, are as much part of the means of the French Empire, as if solemnly incorporated with it. The next summer will probably see the Camps at Roulogne revived and occupied by the legious destined for the invasion of Great Britain. Against a danger so proximate and assured, the strongest security next to the soriet and unanimity of the people, will rest in an Administration comprising the takents of the leading men of the land. No parrow arrangement will of ought to satisfy the Country, It is not " your safe politicians" (men whose only merit consists in meaning well) can oppose and controul our implacable enemy. The enthusiasm and vigour and devotedness of the Country must be awakened and excited. Let not our gallant population be palsied by any pusilanimous sentiment. His Majesty will, no doubt, exercise the high prerogative with which the Constitution has invested him, according to the best of his judgment, for the benefit of us all; and we will as we ought, acquiesce in the choice he shall make. But between action and passion, the difference in political arithmetic, is incalculable. The state of Europe is such that we fear no permanent repose can be enjoyed, until the ambition of France is either satiated or destroyed. When the sea is unruffled and the sky serene, the most inexperienced seaman in the ship can take his spell at the helm, but when the tempest comes, when the

"Lab'ring bark climbs hills of seas,"
