O'Sullivan, of Cork, is now making, both in this and the sister kingdom, (assisted, no doubt, by the co-operation of the other respectable Paper Makers of the kingdom) to preserve this valuable article from the misrepresentations of commercial jealousy on the other side of the water, we trust may be crowned with the success which they deserve, and that the native industry of Ireland may be suffered to come into the English market, with those advantages to which it is so fairly entitled.

Wednesday his Majesty's ship Brilliant, Captain Barrie, arrived at the Cove of Cork, from a cruise.

Thursday his Majesty's ship Alcmena, Captain Brisbane, and sloop Espiagle, Captain Morris, arrived in Cork harbour from a cruise.

On Monday last, the William, Captain Sinclair, a West-Indian, outward-bound, from Liverpool to Cork, for convoy, and from thence to Trinidad, ran on shore on Dunmore-strand, nearly opposite the hotel. The crew have been all saved—and the vessel and cargo (the latter consisting mostly of stores), are likely to be got off, without sustaining any material injury. This vessel, considering her situation, had a wonderful escape from destruction—she remained several hours on a lee-shore, expecting every moment to be dashed against the rocks. In consequence of signals from those on shore, she ran in on the strand, and both lives and property were most probably preserved by this judicious conduct.—Brigadier-General De L'Hoste, who resides at Dunmore, immediately paid every possible attention that such a misfortune would admit of—and his exertions were actively seconded by the inhabitants of the village, who vied with each other in rendering their services. The sea fencibles of the district also essentially contributed their assistance by guarding the vessel during the night; and Mr. Kennedy, who is agent on this coast to the principal London Insurance Companies, has been as alert as usual in attending to the interests of the underwriters. (*Waterford Chronicle*.)

Yesterday, at an adjournment of the Quarter Sessions for this City, Michael Normile, Sawyer, was tried for assaulting John Ledge, Slater.—Upon the most satisfactory evidence being adduced the Jury without much hesitation found him guilty.
