Considerable apprehensions are entertained for the safety of the West India fleet which sailed from Cork in October, under convoy of the Fishguard and Wolverene. A letter from Captain Wilson of the Neptune, belonging to the fleet, and arrived at Tortola, has been received at Glasgow. It states that on their departure from Madeira, having previously separated with the Wolverene from the main body of the fleet, they fell in with a French squadron, which captured 15 out of 17 sail. The Neptune and the Robert, both from Lancaster, effected their escape.

On Monday night the Post Boy conveying the Mails from Tralee, Listowel, and Tarbert, for Dublin, together with the bye letters for this city, was stopped by two men between Tarbert and Glin, who robbed him of the entire.

Lord Erskine is the second Scotchman who has filled the office of Lord High Chancellor of England, and Mr. Ponsonby, to whom the Great Seal of Ireland will doubtless be given, will be the second Irishman ever appointed Chancellor of that part of the United Kingdom.

A few nights ago, a large West Indiaman, name unknown, was totally wrecked on Branagh Island, west of Arran. We are happy to mention that the crew succeeded in getting safe on shore; but the severity of the weather prevented any relief being sent them. Her cargo consisted of sugar, coffee, cotton, &c.

Extract of a letter from an Officer in the 8th, or King's own, to his friends in Cork:

"Yarmouth Roads, Feb. 9, 1806, Ardent Transport, No. 81.

"The first division of the army embarked at Bremerble on the 29th ult. and sailed on the 3d inst. for the Downs, but were obliged to put in here. The first fair wind we are to sail for the Downs, and report says we are for Ireland."

The following paragraph appeared in the Star, of Saturday last:

"Mr. Ryan, at whose house in Marlborough-street, Dublin, the meetings of the Roman Catholic Committee were held, wrote to Mr. Fox, congratulating him on his accession to political power, and hoped that he would not forget his friends the Irish Catholics, who had always supported him. Mr. Fox answered the letter in a general manner, thanked the Gentleman for his congratulations; said, that in or out of office, he would not forget the Irish Catholics, and that Mr. Ryan might make what use he should think proper of his letter."
