The election for the city of Waterford, it seems will be contested, William Congreve Alcock, Esq. having started in opposition to Sir John Newport, who vacated his seat on being appointed Chancellor of the Irish Exchequer.

A letter from a young gentleman on board the Gorgon, lately stationed in our river, to his father in this city, dated Feb. 10, 1806, states, they arrived safe at Milford Haven, and that on the 3d day after sailing from the Shannon, they met with an Indiaman in distress, saved the crew, but sunk the vessel; which contained 290 casks Sugar, 150 bags Cocoa, and 50 bags Cotton.—They also met with a London brig, her foremost only standing, which they towed in safe.

Our Tarbert correspondent informs us, that the Kerry Mail was not robbed between Glin and Ballybahill.

On Wednesday morning, an account of the loss of the brig Henry, Hay, master, from London for this port, was received in town; she came to anchor on Sunday night at Rahee, drifted on the south shore a few miles below Baslebar, near the entrance of this river—got on a rock, close to a cliff, and next morning went to pieces. The captain, wife, and five of the crew unfortunately perished. The cargo, consisting of teas, sugars, garden-seeds, saltpetre, leather, porter, carriages, &c. was totally lost.
