On the night of the 9th inst. a number of men,  
armed, attacked the house of one Cooper, a  
sportsman, near Bansha, co. Tipperary, and de-  
manded two guns which were left in his care, by

were returned by Cooper and his sons, when the

to depart. One of Cooper's sons having recei-  
ved a ball in the shoulder, Mr. Quinlan, the Parish  
Priest, with great humanity, had him conveyed  
to the town of Tipperary, for Surgical aid, and  
he is now recovering.

The Prussian Government has lately ordered a  
prize medal to be struck, for the purpose of pro-  
moting vaccine inoculation. The value of the  
gold one is 50 ducats, and the silver one weighs  
8 ounces. On one side is a bust of the king,  
with this circumscription:—"Fredericus Wilhel-  
mus Rex Pater Patriæ." The reverse contains a  
côw, carrying the Goddess of Health through the  
sea, and is represented as just reaching the shore.  
The circumscription is "In to suprema salus."

It is stated that in January, 1806, the stock  
of cotton in Great Britain, exceeded that of the  
same period in 1805, from 20 to 30,000 bags.  
It is also stated, that the import will not be  
less from Orleans this year than from 50 to 60,000  
bales, and the increase from Carolina and Gor-  
gia at least one third more than in 1805.
