Where presumed grievances only be aggravated by real insult, we should honour of our countrymen too much to permit them in attempting to remove the one, and themselves to feel the severity of the other.

this interview at least this good will result that the people of Ireland will be taught not to look for redress where it cannot reasonably be obtained. They will learn to suffer with dignity, and not be inclined to complain without effect.

time for reform and emancipation is like the dawn of day.

"For ever parted, yet for ever near." All we may expect—which none can realise—is that Mr. Fox's attempt to emancipate the Catholics, as successful as Mr. Pitt's endeavours to emancipate the Blacks. He may impose upon his countrymen, and possibly upon himself—but the event will decide on these opinions.

The dignity of legislative deliberation can in no remote degree be controuled by the voice of popular clamour, it is better to bury the effects of agitation in eternal oblivion, than to disturb the general tranquillity, by unavailing and unprofitable debate.

It will not be said that we endeavoured to clog the machinery, or embarrass the operation of government by the introduction of questions having a tendency to irritate. We intended the measure as a means of conciliation, not of controversy—not of internal weakness, but of external strength. But if the people of England seem so ready against its adoption, we desist—

Cæstus artemque repono—
It is the spirit of the giver, not the value of the gift, that we should prize and conserve. Without this animating principle would the measure and paralyze itself. The temple of concord would be overthrown by the hands intended to perfect it. The site of the temple would be covered with hideous ruins, and in the place intended for our safety we should only find instruments to complet our destruction.
