The London Gazette of Tuesday night last contains his Majesty's grant to Lieut. Gen. Sir John Doyle, Lieutenant Governor of Guernsey, to bear certain honourable additions, together with supporters, to his Armorial Ensigns, in consideration of his faithful and zealous exertions in his Majesty's service on divers occasions, and particularly during the glorious operations of the British arms in Egypt.

Rutherford, who stands charged with the murder of three seamen of his Majesty's ship Trident, while commander of that ship at Butcher's Island, near Bombay, in the East Indies, in March, 1801, and who escaped from the Salvador del Mundo, at Plymouth, on the 12th inst. by jumping overboard.
