

ity of Fulda, the last occupier of which, the Prince of Orange, is to be compensated with the Bishopric of Osnaburgh. The States of the Church, too, are doomed to undergo the revolutionary process. The conduct of Bonaparte to the Pope combines in it, both sarcasm and ingratitude. He might as well have eked out a precarious existence in some of the departments of France, as on the borders of the stagnant lakes of Venice, where, it appears, his future residence is to be established.

The *Moniteur* of the 1st inst. contains a Message of the Emperor to the Senate, and the Speech by which it was preceded from the Arch-Chancellor of the Empire. From these documents we learn, that he has created Prince Joseph King of Naples and Sicily; that he has given the Duchy of Guastalla to his sister the Princess Paulina, and her husband Prince Borghese; that the Duchies of Berg and Cleves have been conferred upon Murat; and that the attachment and services of Berthier have been rewarded with the principality of Neuchatel. The Imperial decrees for regulating these dignities occupy several columns of the Official Paper. He has introduced one institution into his system of a federative Empire which may, if the system shall outlive its founder, be productive of important political consequences. He has, at the time that he declares the independence and separation of the Kingdoms of Italy, and of Naples and Sicily, from the French Empire, reserved to himself, as head of the Federative Constitution, the power of creating a number of Grand Duchies, Fiefs of the Empire, in these several States. To each of these, of which the Venetian territories are to furnish twelve, Naples six, Parma and Placenza three, and Massa and Carrara one, considerable revenues are to be appropriated. The petty Sovereigns who are to rule over them, are, in the first instance, to be nominated by the head of the French Empire, and as often afterwards as vacancies shall arise from default of male issue.

In another decree it is declared, that the kingdom of Italy, until it shall have created an army of its own, shall be defended by French troops, to be paid and maintained by the Emperor; and for this purpose he orders, that two millions five hundred thousand livres (100,000*l.*) shall be remitted to his Imperial Treasury every month, from his Treasury as King of Italy. The army is to protect the Italian Kingdom for six years, at first, and to prolong its services, should the circumstances of Europe, at the expiration of that period, require it.

It is rather singular, that the Dutch Papers are entirely silent respecting the proceedings of the Batavian Legislature.

A few days ago, as the fashionable Mrs. C. was entering the drawing-room, on a visit, she suddenly stopped at the door, and could proceed no farther, when it was found that the train of her gown had been shut in the carriage door below!!!

The Earl of Calidon, the Earl and Countess of Enniskillen, Lady Blaney and family, and Lady E. Alexander, with all their suite arrived on Saturday morning last, at Holyhead from Dublin. They came over in the Union packet, and landed, after a tempestuous voyage of 38 hours, at sea.

A periodical work, now published at Petersburg, in the German language, contains some interesting articles on the progress of knowledge and civilization in Russia. From discoveries recently made, there is reason to hope that some of the Greek works, supposed to be entirely lost, will be found in the Russian Convents.

We have inserted, in another part of our paper, a copy of the Prussian Proclamation for the exclusion of British trade from the ports of the North Sea. This State Paper, which seems framed particularly for Hanover, assigns no other reason for this extraordinary measure, than that it is in consequence of a treaty between France and Prussia. Possibly the order of the Prussian Government may be more explicit on this point. The style of the Proclamation is sufficiently mild, but the proceeding is not the less effectual as against us on that account.

Cork, April 11.—The Sea Horse transport from the Cape of Good Hope, has arrived at Cove. She had been put into Westpoint, and there Lieutenant Daly of the Diadem, who was charged with Dispatches from Sir D. Baird and Sir Home Popham, announcing the surrender of Jansens' army, and their being embarked, and on their way to England, on board ten transports, under the command of Captain Butterfield, of the Royal Navy.

Several Prussian vessels in this harbour have been laid under detention, in consequence of orders received to that effect.

On Thursday last the 47th Regiment of Foot, marched from this city, where they had been for a considerable time quartered, and embarked on board the transports at Monkstown. The transports will proceed first to the Downs. The ultimate destination of the regiment is not known, but it is said to be under orders for foreign service.

Tralee, April 11.—On Tuesday last a very melancholy accident happened in this neighbourhood—a lad, aged 19 or 20, the son of an honest, reputable, and wealthy farmer, named John Stack, of Gurrane, near this town, driving a car to market with a load of potatoes, the horse took fright and ran off, the young man, in his efforts to stop the horse, was unfortunately thrown down, when shocking to relate the carr wheel crushed his head and killed him on the spot.
