A French privateer infests the mouth of St. George's Channel. She has captured the Recovery, belonging to Clyde, and apprehensions are entertained for several other Clyde ships that had sailed to join the convoy at Cork, for the West Indies.

The trading smack Nelson, of Aberdeen, armed by Government, commanded by Captain Smith, on her way up from Aberdeen to London, was attacked by a French lugger privateer off Flamborough Head, on Sunday last. Captain Smith, immediately prepared for action, stood up to the lugger, and fired several guns; upon which the lugger immediately hauled her wind, and stood out to sea in great haste—to the spirited conduct of Captain Smith, the owners have certainly been indebted for the safety of the vessel. Captain Smyth, was eight days at sea, and during all that time saw no British ship of war whatever.

The 3d battalion of the 27th foot is to be the permanent recruiting battalion of the 1st and 2d battalions of that Corps, which continues under the command of the Earl of Moira.

The MAYOR in the Chair

Resolved unanimously, That the State of Limerick in general, and particularly the N. in respect to many important matters of Police, as to render highly necessary obtaining of an Act of Parliament, calculating defects, and providing such salutary powers as may tend to general safety and

That the principle of equal Taxation of property liable to be rated, and the appointment of Commissioners for carrying into effect the several Acts, meet with our full approbation, and be adopted by the beneficial operation of such other places, where they have been adopted

That a Committee of Twenty-one be appointed to examine the Clauses and Provisions of the Bill presented to Parliament by Colonel Vereker, and that it is framed upon principles calculated to promote the welfare and secure the interests of the entire City, and what alterations may be advised thereof, in order to render it as generally applicable to the Inhabitants of Limerick, as circumstances may require
