At a Meeting of Inhabitants of the City of Limerick, friendly to the PRINCIPLE of a GENERAL BILL, held in the Tholsel Chamber, by Adjournment, on Tuesday the 22d day of April, 1806,

## The MAYOR in the CHAIR;

David Dwyer, Esq. Chairman of the Committee appointed at the Meeting on Tuesday last, presented the Report of the said Committee, which is as follows, viz.

The Committee appointed to examine the Bill now before Parliament, for "Regulating the Police of this City, and for other purposes therein-mentioned," report that they have devoted a great part of their time, since the day of their appointment, to an accurate and minute examination of the Bill. They have read it paragraph by paragraph; and attentively considered the import and tendency of each Section as they went along: with only this exception, that there was one head, through which they had not time fully to proceed, and the consideration of which they have therefore been obliged to defer; but concerning the detail of which there is yet time enough to decide: they mean the Clauses relative to the River and Harbour, concerning the expediency of retaining which in the Bill they are, however, agreed, but to which they would recommend a Clause to be added, enacting, that the powers thereby given should not be exercised till called for and approved of by the persons most interested in the safe navigation of the River and the improvement of the Harbour.

The Clauses also relating to the supplying of the Town with Pipe-Water, they are of opinion should be retained in the Bill, as there is no doubt but that many and great advantages would result from the measures therein set forth being pursued. As, however, there are some important circumstances on this head which cannot now be sufficiently ascer- tained, and as the opinion of many of the Inhabitants seems to be, AT PRESENT, adverse to the measure, the Com- mittee have agreed that it would be proper to restrict the Com- missioners from acting on those Clauses, until their so doing shall be approved of by a majority of the persons qualified to vote on the election of Commissioners.

Respecting the other Clauses and Provisions of the Bill, the Committee report, that they consider them wise and necessary, well calculated to answer the object for which they were designed, namely, to promote the welfare and prosper- ity of the Town, and the comfort, convenience, and safety of its inhabitants.

They consider that the powers vested in the Commissioners are no more than are expedient, and necessary to render the Bill effectual, and useful in operation; that every prudent and practicable precaution has been taken to guard against any abuse of such powers, and that there is no reason to apprehend but that they will be exercised here, with as much ad- vantage to the Public; as they have been in other Towns for which Bills of a similar nature have been enacted.

The Committee have had much pleasure in observing, that particular clauses have been introduced, calculated to relieve the POOR from all Taxation under the Bill, as well as to facilitate the collection of the Taxes from those on whom they will fall, and prevent the differences that now frequently arise as to the payment of rates in Houses occupied by several Tenants. They find also, that the principle of imposing Taxes in proportion to the value of property liable there- to, IN ALL PARTS OF THE TOWN, has been acted upon uni- formly throughout the Bill, and extended also to such rates as the Inhabitants, under other Acts of Parliament, are required to applot upon themselves.

The principal alterations which the Committee think it ex- pedient to recommend, are these:

1st, That the continuance of the Parochial Commissioners in office, should be limited to three years, by which means the Inhabitants will have it in their power, as frequently as is consistent with the proper execution of the duty, to express their opinion of the conduct of their Commissioners; and the duties of a troublesome office may be more equally di- vided among the Inhabitants, than if Commissioners once appointed were to retain the situation for life.

2dly, That an addition should be made to the clause re- lating to "Actions brought by the Commissioners" calcu- lated to facilitate to the Defendant, in case judgment should be given for him, the recovery of his costs:

3dly, That Stores, Mills, Breweries, Manufactories, &c.
