LIMERICK, MAY 6.

His Majesty's Tender *Elerington*, arrived from Cove the 3d instant, at her usual place of anchorage for the reception of volunteers for the naval service. There were nearly a dozen able-bodied men put on board her since her arrival.

This morning about 100 volunteers from the 2d battalion of the 61st regt. quartered here, marched for Cork, there to embark to join the 1st battalion now in Sicily.

The first division of the King's German Legion, marched in here this day from Formoy, on their route to Gort.

*The Austrian General Brady.*—The *Moniteur* of the 18th inst. states, that the ancestors of General Brady, who delivered up Cattaro to the Russians, were *English*. The fact is, that this Austrian General, whose real name is O'Brady, was born in Ireland, in 1754; and is a descendant of a respectable Irish Roman Catholic family. A relation of his, General Brown; placed him, in 1770, as a cadet in the Austrian service, and in the corps of the engineers, where he had been advanced to the rank of a Captain, when in 1788 the war broke out between Austria and Turkey. During the siege of Belgrade, by the Emperor Joseph II. in 1789, he distinguished himself so much, that he was nominated a Knight of the order of Maria Theresa, with the appointment of a Major. In 1790, he served under Field Marshal Bender, in the Low Countries, and was promoted to a Colonelcy. In 1792, the present Emperor made him one of his Chamberlains, and he married a rich Irish widow, Mrs. Moore. In 1794 he was advanced to a Major-General; and in 1797, at the recommendation of the Archduke Charles, to a Lieutenant-General. During the different sieges and campaigns, from 1793 to 1800, he particularly caused himself to be remarked by his talents and valour, and was in reward intrusted with the consequential place of a Governor of Venetian Dalmatia, when, by the peace of Luneville that country was given up to Austria. Here his wisdom, prudence, and moderation, have caused the inhabitants almost to forget their former and almost hereditary invecracy to the house of Austria, of which four
