

which never quits her, begins by a declaration of war, and does to Prussia what she did to Holland, Spain, and France. Vessels are to be taken, a flourishing commerce to be pillaged—every thing must yield to such considerations—it is by war they must begin."

The following letter, dated Lubeck, May 13, proves how much the pressure of the war begins to be felt in the States of Prussia.—"The merchants here are very sanguine that the next mails from England will bring them intelligence that the blockade will be raised, in consequence of the declaration of Prussia, that it was in no wise her intention to interrupt her intercourse with England. For my part, I am of opinion, that it is, nevertheless, consistent with sound policy to continue the blockade, in order to leave no opening for the export of Prussian produce.—The dissatisfaction in that country, particularly in Silesia, where the linen trade is at a complete stand, is general, and in a twelvemonth would produce every effect that could be wished for. I sincerely hope Administration will not waver in the steps it has adopted, but continue them with firmness and vigour. In Bordeaux the merchants are obliged to resume their exercise as at the height of the revolution. I am much mistaken if a few months do not bring about great changes there."

On the 19th ult. an attempt was made to set fire to the town of Point Petre, Gaudaloupe. No other damage was sustained than the burning of two houses.

The Providence, Hodge, from London of Quebec, was abandoned at sea on the 8th April last. The crew were taken on board the Nemesis frigate.

The fleet for Newfoundland, which sailed from Portsmouth on the 18th of March, was left on the 16th of the following month, in lat. 45. 57. N. long. 32. W. under convoy of his Majesty's ship Heron, W. S. S. W.

### LAW INTELLIGENCE.

COURT OF KING'S BENCH, LONDON, MAY 16.  
Female Jealousy.

Mr. Jervis moved for a Habeas Corpus to bring up a Lady from the gaol of Winchester, she having been committed for feloniously pouring aquafortis upon the cloaths of another Lady, upon the ground that the commitment did not state the offence to have been committed in a public street or highway. The affidavit upon which he moved stated the offence to have been committed in consequence of jealousy, and that the party threw the aquafortis as her rival passed the street door. This supplied the deficiency in the commitment, and the Court said the Learned Counsel might take the Habeas Corpus if he chose, but he should consider the expence would fall upon his client, and in the end, perhaps, not produce the intended effect.

Mr. Jervis said he would consider of it.

After this the Judges adjourned to the High Court of Parliament.

### DUBLIN, MAY 28.

Monday night one of the mail coaches, driving through Parliament-street, ran over a fine boy, an apprentice to a lock smith in Sycamore-street. He was immediately taken to the Old Custom-house, and treated with the greatest humanity by the officers of the 28th regiment. He did not survive long, the wheel having passed over his neck.

Last night, about 10 o'clock, as Henry Dwyer and William Croker, Esqrs. and Major O'Brien, were coming to town from the co. Clare, they were stopped at Pass, near this city, by three armed footpads, who robbed them of their watches and some cash.

We understand that the person lately shot on Kilworth mountain, by two of the Fermoy yeomen, as stated in this paper, is now known to be John M. Turney, formerly a musician in the 21st Dragoons—his body has been hung in chains near the place where he was shot.

On Monday night last, the house of the Rev. Irwin Whitty, at Kilrush, was robbed of a new suit of black cloaths, 2 case of pistols, thirty rounds of ball-cartridge, 36 ten-penny pieces, and some halfpence; on the evening following, a man of the name of Slattery, who had just landed at one of our quays, from Kilrush, was taken up on suspicion by Mr. Wrenn, a revenue officer and Mr. George Parker, and committed to the city jail by Sheriff M'Mahon; he has since fully confessed the robbery. When taken he had on the coat and waistcoat of Mr. Whitty.

This morning, Brigadier General Michell, and Staff, left this city, to inspect the Yeomen Corps of the counties of Clare and Tipperary.

Committed to the County Jail by the Right Honourable Lord Massy, on Monday last, Nicholas Hayes, Steward to Thomas Grady, of Belmont, Esq. charged with having embezzled, while in his service, to the value of 700*l.* and upwards.
