Lord Bishop of Limerick, Ardfert and Aghadoe.—His Lordship was consecrated Bishop of Killaloe in the year 1780, and translated from thence to Limerick in 1794, on the death of the Right Hon. Lord Glentworth.—He has left issue one son, who is married to Lady Anne Lindsay, sister to the Right Hon. the Earl of Belcarras.-His Lordship has been interred in Westminster Abbey.
